

# Types of Private Educational Choice Programs

# EDUCATION SAVINGS ACCOUNTS (ESAs)

Publicly funded, government-authorized savings account with restricted, but multiple uses for educational purposes.

## TAX CREDIT SCHOLARSHIPS

Taxpayers receive full or partial tax credits when they donate to nonprofits that provide private school scholarships.

#### TAX CREDIT ESAs

ESAs funded through tax credit scholarships.

#### SCHOOL VOUCHERS

Pays partial or full tuition for their child's private school


## REFUNDABLE TAX CREDITS

State income tax relief for approved educational expenses. Parents receive up to the full credit even if its value exceeds what they owe the state in taxes.

# INDIVIDUAL TAX CREDITS/DEDUCTIONS

Income tax relief for approved educational expenses.









#### SCHOOL TYPE PREFERENCE VS. ENROLLMENT, 2024

There continues to be a substantial disconnect between parents' schooling preferences and actual enrollment patterns. Three in five parents would choose a school type other than public school.

Public Charter School Private School Homeschool



#### PUBLIC FAVORABILITY OF K-12 CHOICE POLICIES, 2013-2024

About two-thirds of Americans support school vouchers, charter schools, and tax-credit scholarships. Support for ESAs is much higher at 76%.





#### PARENTS' FAVORABILITY OF K-12 CHOICE POLICIES, 2014-2024

Parent support for K–12 choice policies is consistently high. ESAs remain the most popular school choice policy for the eighth consecutive year.

#### **DEMOGRAPHIC SUPPORT FOR ESAs**

Support for ESAs is strongest amongst school parents, Hispanic adults, and Millennials. Respondents from rural areas are least likely to support ESAs.





#### Preferred School Qualities


When it comes to your child's school, which of the following qualities do you want in the school that they attend?

#### Choosing a School


Would you send your child to a school... (the various options complete the sentence)

It is important that my child's school teach them to discuss contentious topics in a calm and rational manner


I want my child's teachers to keep their politics to themselves

Books with explicit sexual content are inappropriate for my child


It is important that my child's school works to instill patriotism in its students
